

Selectmen's Meeting – December 27, 2004

Dr. Bowcock, Mr. Silvia and Mr. Eckenreiter were present.

Also in attendance was Jeffrey Osuch.

Dr. Bowcock called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

Mr. Silvia motioned to approve the minutes of December 6, 2004. Mr. Eckenreiter seconded. Vote was unanimous.

Mr. Silvia motioned to approve the minutes of December 13, 2004. Mr. Eckenreiter seconded. Vote was unanimous.

Mr. Silvia motioned to approve the minutes of the December 13, 2004 executive session. Mr. Eckenreiter seconded. Vote was unanimous.

Mr. Silvia motioned to approve the minutes of the December 14, 2004 executive session. Dr. Bowcock seconded. It was so voted. Mr. Eckenreiter abstained.

TEIXEIRA'S AUTO SALES, INC.

Lou Teixeira of Teixeira's Auto, Inc., 132 Alden Road, was in attendance to request changing the auto dealer license from "50 vehicles to the previously approved 175". Mr. Teixeira stated all the necessary paperwork had been approved and signed off by the various Town departments. The Board of Health did sign off. Memos from the Building Commissioner and the Director of Planning and Economic Development did not give approval for the increase. The Planner requested Mr. Teixeira submit a detailed layout plan demonstrating the number of cars the site can hold. (See attached memo.) The Building Commissioner has questions concerning final paving of the lot, lighting and the Conservation Commission has issues with the landscaping. Discussion ensued. Mr. Eckenreiter motioned to approve the 175 cars that were previously approved by the Board of Selectmen. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. This is still a temporary license. Mr. Teixeira was instructed to contact the Building Commissioner and the Town Planner to resolve the outstanding issues.

ANIMAL CONTROL

Diane Hanrahan, her daughter Lisa Ciszewski, Sheila Dolan and the Animal Control Officer were present. Ms. Hanrahan requested a meeting with the Selectmen to discuss issues pertaining to her lost cat being euthanized and the manner in which the situation was handled by the Animal Control Officer. Ms. Hanrahan, Ms. Ciszewski and Ms. Dolan summarized the events leading up to the cat being euthanized. (See attached letter.) The Animal Control Officer summarized her letter to the Board in response to Ms. Hanrahan's letter. (See attached.) Discussion followed. The Board agreed to have the Personnel Board review the job description/job procedures for the Animal Control

Officer and to also review policies and procedures for the ACO. Ms. Hanrahan submitted a list of suggested policy changes for the Animal Control Officer.

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S REPORT

Second interviews for the position of Treasurer/Director of Finance will be held on December 28th beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Town Hall will close at 12:00 noon on December 30th and will be closed all day December 31st.

Mr. Osuch will meet with Joe Booth from Dyer Brown Architects on January 4th to discuss the High School gym.

Meeting with Brian B. Smith is scheduled for January 6th at 1:00 p.m.

The Mattapoissett River Valley Water Treatment Plant project is ranked #2 in the State and eligible for an interest rate of 2%. The plant will be built in Mattapoissett.

Mr. Silvia motioned to authorize the Police Chief to sign the "Application for Transfer of Federally Forfeited" assets and to request funding. Mr. Eckenreiter seconded. Vote was unanimous. (See attached.)

NSTAR Hearing for proposed pole locations on Eaton Road will resume on January 10th at 7:00 p.m. NSTAR requested the Selectmen visit the site before the hearing.

Hearing for proposed mooring and parking fees will resume on January 10th.

ANIMAL SHELTER

Donations to the Gift Account totaling \$126.00 were accepted.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT

Because of health reason, Randall Durrigan submitted his resignation as Chief Wire Inspector effective December 1, 2004. The Board wished him a speedy recovery and thanked him for his many years of dedicated service to the Town.

The Building Commissioner requested George Gracia be appointed Chief Wire Inspector and the Associate Wire Inspector position be advertised.

The Planning Board requested a joint meeting with the Board of Selectmen and Board of Public Works to discuss the Waldron Woods Subdivision (Forestview Drive). Meeting is tentatively scheduled for Tuesday, January 11th at 6:30 p.m. at the Town Hall.

The Board offered their condolences to the family and friends of the five fishermen lost at sea just before Christmas.


The Board wished everyone a happy, health and safe New Year.

I have reviewed the auto dealer license request for the above referenced business and recommend that the request be tabled until the applicant can submit further information. The request references a previous approval for 175 cars; however, there is no mention of the number of display spaces within the Planning Board's approval. In addition, I feel that the requested 175 display spaces may be more than the site can hold, and allow for proper on site circulation and fire access. Attached is a rough sketch that demonstrates the site can hold approximately 151 display spaces. Please note that this is a rough calculation and a detailed plan would be the only way to determine how many display spaces the site could accommodate.

Therefore, I recommend that the Board require the applicant to submit a detailed layout plan demonstrating what the site can actually hold. The display spaces should be 8' x 18', they can be doubled stacked and there needs to be an 18' access/fire isle after the doubled stacked spaces. These requirements are consistent with what the Planning Board has required of other dealers who have come in with recently special permits. Please note that the attached sketch plan uses these requirements.

I am available to meet with the applicant and his engineer to discuss any proposed display space layouts.

Re: Complaint Against Dog Officer

Dear Board of Selectmen:

It is my intention with this letter to file a complaint against the Dog Officer for the Town of Fairhaven and I am requesting a copy of the job description outlining the responsibilities regarding this position. My pet was reported missing on October 21st 2004 by my daughter Lisa Ciszewski who resides with me at 85 Laurel Street in Fairhaven. All information was relayed to the officer with a request that she please contact us in the event our cat was located injured or deceased. Both local animal hospitals were also alerted and all contact numbers provided. An ad was subsequently placed in the Standard Times and repeated for approximately 30 days. I called the Dog Officer for updates and asked that she contact me so I could make an appointment to view any cats in her shelter. My call was never returned. Both veterinary hospitals were contacted on several occasions to continue posting our missing cat on their bulletin board. I observed for myself that New England Animal Hospital did indeed have the information posted. I called Capeway Hospital and they assured me they would contact me whether a cat fitting that description was brought there injured or deceased. I assured them I would be responsible for medical bills should my pet require medical care.

After 5 weeks without result, on November 25th Mrs. Skaar of 74 Green Street called the Dog Officer to report a cat lingering around her garage acting strange. The Dog Officer claimed the shelter was full and the cat's behavior sounded like a female in heat. She therefore did not respond. On Friday November 26th a neighbor called Ms. Sheila Dolan of Chestnut Street, who cares deeply for animals and told her of the cat lingering around 74 Green Street. Ms. Dolan visited 74 Green Street on Friday and saw that the cat matched the description in the lost and found ad still running in the newspaper. Ms. Dolan said my cat was alive at that time, responded to her touch but did appear in need of

medical care as soon as possible. After informing the Skaar family that she would return with the potential owner, Ms. Dolan went home, called the number in the paper and found it was my address at 85 Laurel Street. She picked up my daughter Lisa, said she believed she had found our cat and they went to 74 Green Street, just around the corner from Laurel Street. The Skaar family informed her that they contacted the Dog Officer again, who came right away and took our pet to Capeway Animal Hospital. They proceeded immediately to Capeway only to be informed the animal was at the shelter. They went to the shelter and found it closed. They went back to Capeway and were informed that Dr. Jayaram had euthanized the cat only moments before. We are talking minutes here, not hours or days. Our cat was alive at the first visit and no one attempted to contact family. Both the Dog Officer & Capeway had all the numbers to locate the owner. Our cat was a 20 lb. declawed, neutered male, charcoal gray with gold eyes and 15 yrs old. I believe it to be unusual for a cat to be that large and yet no one made the connection. Capeway apparently has a contract with the Dog Officer to care for all animals she brings in. I believe the Dog Officer has an obligation to do her best to bring together missing pets with their owners. Especially in this case, due to the constant communication our family attempted to maintain without success with the officer in question, I feel she was derelict in her duty. Her attitude was uncooperative and disinterested. Our pet may very well have had to be euthanized in his own best interest, but an attempt to locate the family was never made so that the critical and irreversible decision to euthanize could have been ours to make.

If in fact a contract does exist between Capeway and the Dog Officer, it is unknown to most of the taxpayers in the Town of Fairhaven. Most of our efforts would have been directed in that location had this been known. By entering into this contract Capeway therefore has accepted an added responsibility to notify family whenever possible. I believe it was possible in this case. Our pet may have been treatable, maybe not, but they dropped the ball. I spoke with a young lady at Capeway within the last two weeks regarding our pet and remarked that you can't miss him because he is so large and solid gray in color. His size alone makes it hard to believe that he could fall through the cracks in your system. The Dog Officer told me she sees 20lb gray cats all the time so it's not unusual and she can't be expected to remember every call. Isn't that why you refer to your notes? The time frame here was less than 5 weeks, not 5 months.

I believe disciplinary action and/or termination is warranted against the Dog Officer. She claimed in a discussion with me on Saturday November 27th, that she is unable to keep track of her notes and does not refer to them for reference. When I questioned whether or not she kept a watch on the lost and found in the newspaper, she claimed she is not required to read, nor does she read them. I believe that should be part of her job responsibilities. What exactly is her job if not to attempt to match missing pets with their owners? If she is unable to perform her duty than she needs an assistant or she needs to be replaced by someone more in tune with communication, responsibility and compassion.

In order for my daughter Lisa to bring our pet to another facility for cremation, the Dog Officer informed her she must pay the \$40.00 hospital bill. Interesting how quickly ownership proved beneficial to them.

I am therefore requesting that a closed hearing be scheduled between all parties as soon as possible to address this unfortunate incident. I will await your response.

Re: Complaint of Diane Hanrahan

On Thursday November 25, 2004, Thanksgiving day I was paged by Fairhaven P.D. in regards to a cat I called and spoke with Elsie Skaar from 74 Green St. She told me that there was a cat hanging around for about 2 hours. It was meowing, rolling and crawling. She said she did not know much about cats and did not know why it would be doing this. She had never seen the cat before. I told her that by what she is describing it could be a female cat in heat. I instructed her to not feed the cat and when it was ready it would probably move on. I told her that because there are no laws that pertain to stray cats we do not just pick them up when they have only been in the area for a short time. If they are sick or injured they will get picked up. I told her at this time the shelter is full and we are not accepting any cats.

On Friday November 26, 2004 I was paged by Fairhaven P.D. at 11:00am in regards to 74 Green St. on the cat. I called Elsie Skaar again and she stated that it was not going away so she let it stay in her garage for the night. She stated that today it looked much worse. I told her that I would be right over and if she was going out to just leave her in a closed box outside the garage. When I arrived a short time later I placed the cat in a carrier. I spoke with Elsie Skaar who stated they were allergic to cats but they did let it stay in the garage. She asked what would happen to the cat. I told her I was taking it to Capeway Vet to be examined and we would go from there. I could not say for sure what would happen. She told me that she had told a neighbor and that someone had been over earlier to look at the cat but did not know if it was their friends cat because they did not know what it looked like. Mrs.Skaar did not know who had looked at the cat.

Once at Capeway Vet. I spoke with Dr. Jayaram. She examined the cat immediately. The cat was a gray male. It was obvious that it was emaciated, dehydrated, eyes sunken in and smelled like diesel fuel. Upon further examination it was determined that it had cataracts and was turning yellow and was unable to walk. The head was also bopping showing signs of a possible neurological problem. The cat was suffering and in pain and without further immediate treatment the cat would continue to suffer. It would have been inhumane to keep this cat alive any longer. It was determined the cat was old, had missing teeth and was declawed. It had no collar, no tags or any distinguishing features. The cat was euthanized. I then took it back to the shelter.

At 11:55 am I was paged by Fairhaven P.D. and told to call a Lisa Ciszewski in regards to her cat. It was not clear on how she was informed of the cat. I called her and explained to her what had happened. She asked if it would be possible to see the cat. I told her I was across the street and I would meet her at the shelter if she could come by now. She identified the cat as hers. I asked her if she wanted me to take care of the cat or if she wanted to make arrangements to cremate him. She said she would like to do that because she had her other 2 cats cremated. I asked her if she had a vet and she said New England Animal Hospital. I told her I could take the cat over there if she wanted but she said no it was her cat and she would do it. I asked her to meet me at Capeway and she could speak to the Doctor. I told her if there was a bill for the exam she would have to take care of that. I then placed the cat in the trunk of the car for her.

Once at Capeway Vet. Dr. Jayaram spoke with Lisa and explained her findings. Lisa stated at the end it was her cat and then her mothers and now she has to call her in Florida and tell her. At this point I left and she continued to speak with the doctor.

On Saturday I happened to just check the answering service and there was a call from Diane Hanrahan. I called her, the phone connection was bad, she stated she was on her cell phone. I explained everything to her but she felt that myself and Capeway should of known it was her cat and called her first before doing anything to her cat. I told her the cats well being is considered first. I do not look at phone logs first when an animal is suffering and in need of medical treatment. I did have her information. Two calls were made by her daughter with all the information and I believe I spoke with her daughter on one occasion (10/20 & 10/25). The next call was from Diane Hanrahan with the cat information and that she would run an ad in the newspaper (11/4) No other calls were recieved, no picture flyers were recieved. Diane Hanrahan said the Skaars knew who owned the cat. They did not. They had no information. I told her that I did refer to phone logs all the time but not while I am at a vet with a suffering animal. There was no reasoning with her. I apologized and told her I was sorry for her loss. She stated she would still be contacting The Selectmen.

In talking with Dr. Jayaram I was informed later that she knew the story on how the cat got out. According to Lisa Ciszewski (Diane Hanrahan's daughter) her husband always lets the cat out when he goes outside to smoke. The cat wandered off and they thought it would come back.

The cat id declawed which means it has no front claws. It is disabled. It cannot defend itself in any way. It cannot climb trees to get away from predators. It can no longer protect itself. It can only run. This cat was declawed, had cataracts, was overweight and had missing teeth. How can a responsible pet owner get this animal go outside. An animal is an animal. They are unpredictable. They can change their behavior patterns at anytime. Blame for this animal being euthanized should not be placed on myself or Dr. Jayaram. We did our job. If this cat was properly cared for by their owners this whole event would not have taken place.

I contacted Aimal Rescue League Law Enforcement and I want the Board to know the following: if Dr. Jayaram did not give that animal immediate medical attention she could have suffered criminal consequences. And if I had asked her to hold off on medical treatment while I attempted to search my notes and make phone calls looking for an owner I also could have been criminally charged. I believe this is something neither one of us wants to risk. This is why we did our job in the proper manner. Citizens may not like everything we do but we are asked to do a job to the best of our ability. I believe that I did my best and I believe Capeway Vet and Dr. Jayaram did their best.

Suggested Policy Changes for Animal Control Officer

1. Require Animal Control and Capeway Veterinary Hospital to monitor lost and found in local newspapers, on websites, etc.
2. Citizens should be made aware that a contract to receive animals from Animal Control is in place with Capeway Veterinary Hospital so they can concentrate their efforts in the proper direction.
3. Laws pertaining to the length an animal is held at the shelter should be the same for both cats and dogs. Established hours for viewing at the shelter should be designated.
4. A volunteer program should be implemented to ensure that the best possible effort be made to reunite owners and lost pets. Volunteers could be useful to organize a system that would make it possible to cross check names, phone numbers, etc. with descriptions on file. Perhaps they could also work in conjunction with the contractual animal hospital. They could be available to cover the viewing hours at the shelter mentioned above.
5. A working relationship between Animal Control in neighboring towns as well as local agencies should be established to aid in the effort to local owners, find adequate homes, etc.
