7:10 PM – Public Safety/Chief Souza discussed dispatcher manning issues.(see attached) Mr. Manzone requested letter be sent to Bristol County Commissioners and asked Chief to research alternatives.

At 7:15 PM Mr. Manzone motioned to go into Executive Session to discuss dispatcher negotiation issues and police contract and to reconvene in open session. Mr. Silvia seconded. It was so voted. Roll 2-0.

Open session reconvened at 7:30 PM

APPOINTMENTS CONT'D.

7:30 PM – Community Block Grant(see attached)

Mr. Roth and John Ryan, Breezeway Consulting, were present. Presentation made.

Mr. Roth explained Bridge St. area;

1. Utilities – water, sewer, storm drain, etc.
2. Housing – Rehab Lead Abatement
3. No applications will be submitted for N. Fhvn., hopefully in the future once CDBG has approved project in Cushman area.

Mr. Ryan from Breezeway explained status of Bridge St. survey; eligible 53.4% low – moderate income. Tibbetts will prepare a preliminary plans and detailed cost estimate. (see attached) Housing rehabilitation program is proposed to be three houses at \$30,000 per house – Deferred Loan 0%; Interest 15 years, retired at 5% per year; if property owner lives in house for 15 years – no payments; if house sold then payments of balance of loan will have to be made minus 5% per year - forgiveness to when sold. A draft of the Community Development Strategy was presented. Discussion ensued. Next meeting to discuss this will be 3/8/2006.

Motion to submit a 2006 Block Grant Application

Moved by Mr. Manzone and seconded by Mr. Silvia that the Board of Selectmen approve the Community Development Strategy and authorize the submission of an application for \$600,000 for the Cushman Park Neighborhood Target Area including housing rehabilitation loans and grants, infrastructure improvements on Bridge St. and general administration. A grant consulting firm through the Fairhaven Planning Department will administer the grant. The Board authorizes the Chairman to sign the application on behalf of the Board. It was so voted, 2-0.

Motion to designate the Chairman as the Environmental Certifying Officer

Moved by Mr. Manzone and seconded by Mr. Silvia that the Selectmen appoint Michael Silvia as the Environmental Certifying Officer for CDBG projects. It was so voted, 2-0.

Motion to amend the contract with Breezeway Farm Consulting by \$5,000.00

Moved by Mr. Manzone and seconded by Mr. Silvia to amend the contract with Breezeway Farm Consulting, Inc. by increasing their fee by \$5,000 for the purpose of assistance with preparation of the 2006 CDBG application, including \$3,500 for engineering services and \$1,500 for application review. It was so voted, 2-0.

8:00 PM – Memorial Day parade route; Mr. Medeiros and Mr. Ryle were present to discuss route changes. Parade route to start at St. Mary's Church and to end at High School with dedication of plaques for Vietnam, Korean War veterans listing Fairhaven alumni who died in those wars and new plaques for WWI & WWII. Same ceremony as in past years at Riverside Cemetery.

Mr. Manzone motioned to approve the route change for this year. Mr. Silvia seconded. It was so voted.

8:05 PM – Coalition for Buzzards Bay – Mr. Rasmussen and Mr. Decker were present; discussion regarding Viveiros Farm acquisition ensued.(see attached) Meeting with CPA Committee scheduled for 3/8/2006 request Selectmen attend. Mr. Manzone and Mr. Silvia will be present. Town will ask Town Counsel to look at other options available.

8:15 PM – Community Wind – Jim Sweeney explained that next month's deposit on Wind Turbines will have to be made, \$375,000 - \$400,000 in order to have available to erect in late 2007. Avian Study (bird migration) will start by 4/15/06; second study in Fall – Sept.; total cost \$150,000+. Discussion ensued.

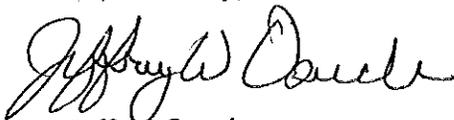

MEMORANDUM

To: Board of Selectmen

RE: Grant Funding for Dispatcher Salaries

Date: February 27, 2006

The Bristol County Homeland Security Grant has been used to fund two dispatcher positions since their creation in order to staff the central communications center. We received \$ 71,531.00 in March, 2004 and \$ 65,600.00 in March, 2005 from that grant program.

I spoke with County Commissioner Christopher Saunders this past week. He informed me that he was unsure about grant funding this year but believed we should expect no more than ½ the amount we received last year.

It should also be noted that we have received a Block Grant or Justice Assistance grant from the federal government for the past 15 years. I received notification that we will no longer receive that grant due to cuts made by the current Administration. This funding has been used over the past year to supplement funding for dispatcher overtime.

The following is a breakdown of the amount of funding remaining in our County Homeland Security account and projection on how long we can pay the salary of two dispatchers out of that account based upon the assumption we do receive the amount estimated by Commissioner Saunders this year.

Gentlemen:

I respectfully request the Board approve installation of a crosswalk at the location where the Phoenix Bike Path crosses Scoticut Neck Road. This recommendation is made after consultation with our department Safety Officer, Macy Joseph.

I fully support the improvements to the intersection the Board of Public Works and Superintendent Robert Carey have developed. This recommendation is made in an effort to improve safety in the short term while funding for the project is being sought.

There are currently very visible signage warning motorists of a "Bicycle Crossing" at that intersection. But our legal authority to enforce a requirement that vehicles yield to pedestrians or bicyclists is limited to those intersections where there exists a "crosswalk marked in accordance with the standards established by the department of highways" pursuant to MGL, ch 89, s.11. I attach a copy of that statute for your review.

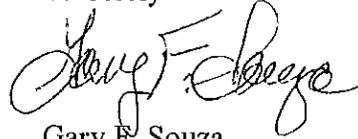
I would also point out that there are currently no visible markings on the roadway delineating the crossing area.

Accordingly, I recommend the Board consider voting to place a well marked crosswalk at that intersection that meets or exceeds the applicable state requirements including appropriate signage and very visible road markings.

I hope the Board will consider this request before usage of the bike path increases with warmer weather.

Our Safety Officer is available to work with the BPW or anyone else the Board directs to ensure the crosswalk meets the standards that would allow us to strictly enforce the yield right of way requirement codified in the attached statute.

PUBLIC WAYS AND WORKS

§ 11. Marked crosswalks; yielding right of way to pedestrians; penalty

When traffic control signals are not in place or not in operation the driver of a vehicle shall yield the right of way, slowing down or stopping if need be so to yield, to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a crosswalk marked in accordance with standards established by the department of highways if the pedestrian is on that half of the traveled part of the way on which the vehicle is traveling or if the pedestrian approaches from the opposite half of the traveled part of the way to within five feet of that half of the traveled part of the way on which said vehicle is traveling.

No driver of a vehicle shall pass any other vehicle which has stopped at a marked crosswalk to permit a pedestrian to cross, nor shall any such operator enter a marked crosswalk until there is a sufficient space beyond the crosswalk to accommodate the vehicle he is operating, notwithstanding that a traffic control signal may indicate that vehicles may proceed.

Whoever violates any provision of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars.

St.1967, c. 405, § 1, was approved June 26, 1967, and by § 3 made effective July 1, 1968.

St.1991, c. 552, § 67, approved Jan. 9, 1992, in the first paragraph, substituted "department of highways" for "department of public works".

Ladies and Gentlemen:

You'll soon be receiving a certified letter from the Town of Fairhaven's Planning Board informing you that a public hearing will be held at Town Hall on Tuesday, February 28th to again consider a request from G. Bourne Knowles & Co., Inc. and Leslie P. Knowles that their three parcels of land listed above be rezoned. As you'll recall from their previous request (defeated by 7 votes at last year's Annual Town Meeting), the zoning of these parcels currently allows for any business use as a matter of right. The Knowles are again asking that the present zoning be changed to multifamily (RC) use which will allow construction of a proposed condominium community, thereby prohibiting the parcels' development as a strip mall or some other allowable business use. Assuming that a majority of Planning Board members vote in favor of the Knowles' Petition at the public hearing, the proposed zoning change will appear on the Warrant at the Annual Town Meeting on Saturday, May 6th.

When the Knowles' brought this same zoning change petition to the Planning Board last year, a substantial number of your neighbors and abutters came to the public hearing to speak in favor of the requested change. The almost unanimous opinion of those present was that a well-designed condominium community was far more desirable at this Route 6 location than a strip mall or other business use. We sincerely hope that you share that opinion, and that you are willing to come to the Planning Board hearing on February 28th and say so.

We have scheduled an informational meeting, to be held at the Courtyard Restaurant, 270 Huttleston Avenue, on Sunday, February 26th at 4:00 PM. A light meal will be served, and you're invited to join us. We'll present plans for our proposed condominium community, and we'll be prepared to answer any questions which you, as neighbors and abutters, might have. We look forward to meeting with you personally at that time.

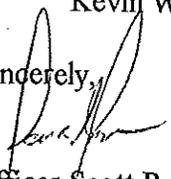
