# Fairhaven Board of Selectmen Meeting Minutes November 10, 2020 

Present: Chairman Daniel Freitas Vice-Chairman Robert Espindola, Selectman Keith Silvia, Town Administrator Mark Rees, and Cable Access Director Derek Frates

The meeting was videotaped on Cable Access and Zoom meeting application.
Chairman Freitas opened the meeting at $6: 34$ pm in the Town Hall Banquet Room and read the following statement:
"This Open Meeting of the Fairhaven Board of Selectmen is being conducted remotely consistent with Governor Baker's Executive Order of March 12, 2020, due to the current State of Emergency in the Commonwealth due to the outbreak of the "COVID-19 Virus."

In order to mitigate the transmission of the COVID-19 Virus, we have been advised and directed by the Commonwealth to suspend public gatherings, and as such, the Governor's Order suspends the requirement of the Open Meeting Law to have all meetings in a publicly accessible physical location. Further, all members of public bodies are allowed and encouraged to participate remotely.

The Order, which you can find posted with agenda materials for this meeting allows public bodies to meet entirely remotely so long as reasonable public access is afforded so that the public can follow along with the deliberations of the meeting.

Ensuring public access does not ensure public participation unless such participation is required by law. This meeting will allow public comment related to the posted agenda items only. For this meeting, Fairhaven Board of Selectmen is convening by telephone conference/video conference via Zoom App as posted on the Town's Website identifying how the public may join.

## Town Administrator Recruitment position Statement

Motion by Espindola, second by Silvia to approve the Town Administrator Recruitment Position Statement (Attachment A). Passed unanimously.

## Screening Committee for Town Administrator Search

Discussion regarding having a Board of Selectmen member sit on the Town Administrator Screening Committee. Silvia and Freitas were in favor of having a selectman be part of the
screening committee. Espindola was against for the reasons stated on Attachment B. Espindola made a motion to not have a selectmen serve on the screening committee. There was not a second. Freitas made a motion to appoint himself as a member of the screening committee, second by Silvia. Motion carried, Freitas and Sylvia-Yes, Espindola -No.

## Approval of the Charge of the Screening Committee

Motion by Espindola, second by Silvia to approve the Charge of the Screening Committee Statement (Attachment C). Passed unanimously.

## COVID Red Zone Designation and Town Offices operations

Mr. Rees informed the board that the state had recently designated Fairhaven as being in the Red Zone for the COVID 19 virus due to an increase in the number of positive test results in recent weeks. Due to this change M. Rees put together a working group consisting H.R. Director Anne O’Brien, Interim Health Agent Sarah Dupont, Deputy Fire Chief Todd Correia and Conservation Agent Whitney McClees to review safety protocols for town offices and recommend changes if necessary. The working group recommended that mask wearing requirements be better adhered to and that remote meetings using zoom technology be the default mode for meetings.

Chairman Freitas opened the meeting at $6: 34 \mathrm{pm}$ in the Town Hall Banquet Room and read the following statement:
"This Open Meeting of the Fairhaven Board of Selectmen is being conducted remotely consistent with Governor Baker's Executive Order of March 12, 2020, due to the current State of Emergency in the Commonwealth due to the outbreak of the "COVID-19 Virus."

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Members of the Finance Committee and the Board of Selectmen met in joint session to discuss the Vote of Article 9 at the Special Town Meeting on October 20, 2020 regarding taking from free cash versus borrowing the money.

Chairman Freitas turned the meeting over to Finance Chairman Elliot.

Town Moderator Mark Sylvia told the Boards that the ultimate authority as to how to spend the money is the Town Meeting members. He said typically the motions are drawn up by Town Counsel but can be amended as long as the vote is a legal vote, Robert's Rules are followed and the motion is debated and then voted by Town Meeting members.

## Discussion of Article 9C: Athletic Turf Field town meeting vote process

Finance Chairman Pat Elliot reminded both Boards that the original motion of this Article was to borrow the money and Town Meeting members ended up voting to take the money from free cash. Mr. Elliot stated tonight's meeting was not to try to change the vote but to learn from it. Board Members don't feel the Town Meeting members understood the impact of this vote and would like to see more education in the future to ensure this situation does not happen again.

There was a discussion of the timeline leading up to Town Meeting and how the second motion was made. The Moderator stated he was aware of a second motion prior to the meeting and discussed this with School Superintendent Dr. Robert Baldwin. Mr. Sylvia suggested as a courtesy that Dr. Baldwin reach out to the Chairs of the Selectman and Finance, Town Counsel and the Town Administrator to inform them of the possibility of the second motion. The concern among the members is that no one knew about the alternate vote prior to the vote taking place.

Finance Committee member Bernie Roderick feels the Town has an obligation to ensure that something like this does not happen in the future.

## Discussion of capital projects utilizing borrowing vs free cash spending

Mr. Rees reminded the members that the role of the Capital Improvement Planning Committee (CIP) is advisory to the Town Administrator. The CIP is to help prioritize projects and then advise the Town administrator and the financial team to determine the needs and wants of each project. The Town Administrator then brings his recommendations to the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee.

## Discussion of impact on present and future town financial resources.

Selectman Espindola presented a power point on how the Town stand in terms of the general fund debt vs. general fund budgets. The Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee agreed they would like to hold more joint meetings in the future to keep the communication between both boards open.

## At 8:04 pm Chairman Elliot turned the meeting back over to Chairman Freitas.

## Appointment of interim Town Administrator

Mr. Rees told the Board this item was just for discussion tonight and not to appoint anyone to the positon of interim Town Administrator at this meeting.

Mr. Rees is hopeful the new Town Administrator will be starting at the beginning of the year but there may be a need for an interim in the overlap of time. The Board discussed if they would like to hire an interim from the outside or internally. Members all felt that someone from within the Town employees would be a good choice for the interim position. Mr. Rees will contact Town Counsel for advice.

At 8:11 pm Mr. Espindola made a motion to adjourn. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0)

## Appointment of Acting Fire Chief

Fairhaven Fire Chief Tim Francis and Fairhaven Deputy Chief Todd Correia met via Zoom with the Board. Chief Francis stated that his upcoming retirement date is on January 8, 2021. Because of the COVID pandemic there is a delay in the civil service exam and the established Fire Chiefs list to hire a permanent candidate from. Chief Francis is recommending Deputy Correia as the provisional Fire Chief until a list is established. Mr. Rees made this recommendation to the Board to appoint Deputy Fire Chief Todd Correia as the provisional Fire Chief.

Mr. Espindola made a motion to approve the appointment by the Town Administrator of Deputy Chief Todd Correia as the provisional Fire Chief. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3$0)$

## PILOT Agreement- 46 Charity Stevens Lane

Town Counsel Tom Crotty told the Board there were some minor technical changes to the contract for the Payment in lieu of taxes (PILOT) for 46 Charity Stevens Lane. Attorney Crotty explained that one issue is the language is that the tax compliance has changed to include child support requirements. The second issue is to account for a small overlapping gap in the payments over the 20 year period. (Attachment A)

Mr. Espindola made a motion to approve the PILOT agreement for 46 Charity Stevens Lane as presented, subject to the 2 technical changes noted by Attorney Crotty. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0)

## Volunteer/Committee Handbook updated

Mr. Rees told the Board the Boards and Committees Handbook has been updated recently. Mr. Espindola made a motion to approve the updated volunteer handbook and to distribute to all impacted volunteers. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0)

## Adjustment of Wage and Classification Schedule, due to Minimum Wage increase

Mr. Rees explained that there will be an increase in minimum wage on January 1, 2021. This will mean an adjustment to the wage and classification schedule for Grades 1 step 6 and Grade 2 step 7.

Mr. Espindola made a motion to adjust the wage and classification schedule due to the minimum wage increase. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0)

## Tax Rate Classification Hearing

At 7:02 p.m. Chairman Freitas opened the public hearing for the Tax Classification by reading the public hearing notice. Via Zoom, members of the Board of Assessors, Chairperson Ronnie Manzone, Pam Davis, Ellis Withington, Assistant Assessor Delfino Garcia and Finance Director Wendy Graves met with the Selectmen as required by law to vote on the minimum residential factor, residential exemption and the small business exemption.

Mr. Espindola made a motion to not choose a residential Exemption. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

Mr. Espindola made a motion to not choose adopting a small commercial business exemption. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

Mr. Espindola made a motion to have a split tax rate with a minimum residential factor of . 876905 Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

There was no public comment. Mr. Freitas closed the public hearing at 7:09 p.m.

We performed the procedures enumerated below, which were agreed to by the Town Administrator, on the Building Department. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of the parties specified in this report. Consequently, we make ho representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures enumerated beloweither for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The procedures are as follows:

- Determine the soyrces ofreyenue for the department, including a detailed listing of source, type, frequency, and expectations of future revenue to be received.
- Provide the Town with pmethodolgey that canbeapplied by the Town to perform similar internal au dits jo the future.
- Through inquiry, review all Building Inspection Fees, (Building, Plumbing, Gas, Electrical) to determine if the structure and design of the fee schedules are such that the calculation of fees for projects is open to interpretation as to how those fees are calculated and if so, make specific recommendations as to how better standardize the calculation so that results are same regardless of who does the calculation.
- Turnover in the Department resulted in changes our original procedures. Based on discussion with Town Administrator, we conducted a series of phone interview with Department and Town personnel to assess procedures used by the department in assessing fees, however, we did not conduct a fraud or forensic investigation.

We have summarized the results of our procedures in the accompanying report.
This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. We were not
engaged to and did not conduct an examination or a review, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion or conclusion, respectively, on the Building Department. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion or conclusion. Had we performed additional procedures; additional matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Town and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than those specified parties.

## BACKGROUND

The Town wants to develop expectations for future revenue projections to aid the Accounting Department in their review of reasonableness of account balances. Furthermore, the Town believes the structure of the Building Department permit fee schedule is open to interpretation and wanted a review of the process including the possibility of misappropriation of assets. The Town engaged us to perform the procedures specified earlier in the Building Department as of the above noted dated.

## RESULTS

## Based on our inquiry we observed the following:

- Most of the personnel we spoke with think that unintentional errors may have occurred in the assessment of fee as the design of the fee schedule is open to interpretation One individual asserted that a favorable fee was assessed to a related party.
- We were provided an electrical permit where the fee chargect was at the resident al rate and not the commercial rate. We do not know the nature of the efror as we wer not engaged to perform a fraud examination.
- We were informed that three different hdiyiduals calcylated fees for electrical permits, and each came ur with a differert feefor the same project.
- A new Burulding Commission has been hired and js implementing an on-line permitting system to as $\$$ ist with transparency of all permits issued. We understand the new software should aid in eliminating fee dalculation errorshant standardizing the process.
- We understand that-the new Commissioner intends on bringing a new fee schedule to the Board also to help eliminate calculations that are open to interpretation.

Based on procedures performed and our inquiry we recommend the following:

- The Town and new Building Commissioner should consult with counsel in respect to approval of permits in accordance with state law.
- The Town should provide additional training to the Department's Administrative Assistant to improve the understanding when calculating fees.
- Each fee calculation should have a secondary review by a knowledgeable individual to ensure the appropriate fee is assessed. Understanding the time constraints when issuing permits, such a secondary review could be performed after the permit is issued to the completeness and accuracy of the fee assessed. Such a secondary review should help eliminate any question about related parties.
- Review the fee schedule with industry consultants to improve the transparency and remove elements of interpretation.
- Internal audit programs have been provided to the Town under separate cover.
- Improve Town-wide internal controls over permitting by sending the Accounting Department quarterly reports from the new on-line permitting system as a tool to match against amounts remitted to the Town Treasurer.
- Long-term revenue projections should be based on rolling 5-year averages adjusted for current economic environment.

## APPEAL FOR PROPOSED STREET LIGHT ON POLE 216-3

Thank you for the opportunity to present this appeal to the board. This appeal is in response to a petition for a street light to be added to pole 216-3 on Reservation Rd. This petition was at first rejected by the recent Town Meeting and was then overturned after Jeff Adesso argued for it.

As a point of note, our house at 14 Reservation Rd. stands directly opposite this pole and we were never told of this petition.

This additional street light would be a direct beam into our second floor, affecting bedroom and bathroom. We already have one street light at pole 103-11, that shines directly into our second floor living room. The shade needs to be pulled down at all times during the night. In the warmer seasons, we are unable to open the window to let in air due to the shade. If this additional light goes in, that would mean all the windows facing Reservation Rd. in both bathroom and bedroom would have to remain closed or having flapping shades all night.

It is our understanding that there are already the required number of lights on our street. It was said that it is a dangerous corner. This is a quiet street with very little traffic. This has been our residence for close to 16 years and we have never seen one accident. In fact, it is more lit than some other parts of the street since there are houses lining both sides - all with outdoor lighting at night. If this is a reason, then every pole should have a street light on it. The few walkers who are out at night should be responsible and always wear bright clothing, carry flashlights and/or wear headlights for their own safety, no matter where they are walking after dark.

It was also brought up that there is an "autistic child" who lives on this street. Firstly, this "child" is neither "autistic" nor a "child". It is our understanding that he is an adult close to 50 years old with special needs. Mr. Adesso should show him the respect he deserves. Why his handicap was even entered into the argument, we have no idea. Secondly, the house Mr. Adesso refers to has a street light in the both the front and back of this property. As for children playing in the street, there are no children living in this neighborhood and we have never seen children playing in the street after dark.

Since learning of this petition, we have spoken to some of our neighbors who had initially signed it and explained what it would mean for our family. In some cases, we were told that it really did not make much of a difference to them (didn't even remember signing petition) and would be just as willing to do without another light. After speaking with another neighbor, he agreed that the money would be better spent on the bike path signal light. All of the people that we spoke with on the petition were surprised to learn that no one bothered to inform us. Some of these people have lived here longer than we have with the existing street lights. Why the need now? As full-time, permanent residents, we see nothing that has changed to justify this added expense to the town.

Additionally, this extra street light will be an extra $\$ 800$ cost to the town. We feel this can best be spent elsewhere. If lighting is an issue, let's fix the solar traffic light at the Bike Path crossing on Sconticut Neck which we fought so hard for while serving the Farihaven Biike Committee. This is a much more effective use of our taxpayer dollars.

In closing, we have no desire to start a neighborhood feud. We only wish to continue living in Fairhaven, the town we chose to retire to, in peace and comfort.
