ARTICLE 6 – STATE AID TO HIGHWAYS

ARTICLE 8 – FAIRHAVEN EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY

A. Roof Repair

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow or transfer from available funds a sum of money to make roof repairs to the Fairhaven Emergency Management headquarters located at 150 Sconticut Neck Road, or to take any other action relative thereto.

B. Cots

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow or transfer from available funds a sum of money to purchase 21 cots for the Emergency Shelter, or to take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 9 – COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

To see if the Town will vote to amend the provisions of Chapter 50 of the Town Code by adding thereto the following as §50-9. entitled “Collective Bargaining Agreements”.

§50-9. COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENTS

- A. The provisions of this Section shall apply to any collective bargaining agreement executed after the effective date of this Section.
- B. Copies of all agreements, in their entirety, entered into with employees of the Town pursuant to collective bargaining, including the current pay schedule and the proposed pay schedule which shall include step increases and longevity, shall be made available for inspection by the public at the locations specified in this Section no later than 12:00 p.m. on the tenth (10th) day before the Town Meeting is to vote on the question of appropriating funds to implement any such agreement.
- C. Accompanying all such agreements shall be a document highlighting the changes from the previous agreement and the estimated total cost of each change over the life of the agreement. Such changes shall include but not be limited to any actual payment or potential payment for any: stipend, bonus, additional sick days, early termination notice, uniform allowance, personal days, or any matter which will require monetary payment or compensatory time to be made or given to an employee.
- D. On or before the time called for above, one (1) copy of any such agreement shall be provided to the Town Accountant, the Finance Committee and the Board of Selectmen; and, an additional two (2) copies of all agreements and accompanying documents shall be placed on file in the following locations no later than the time called for above before such agreements are to come before the Town Meeting for any action:
 - 1. Board of Selectmen’s Office;
 - 2. Town Clerk’s Office
 - 3. For such agreements involving employees of the various divisions under the jurisdiction of the Board of Public Works, in addition to the offices of the Board of Selectmen and Town Clerk, the same shall also be placed on file at the Board of Public Work’s Administration Building;Once filed, said agreements and accompanying documents shall be made available for inspection to the public during normal business hours for each such location. A copy of the same shall be provided to any person requesting a copy; provided, however, that said copies shall be made only upon prior payment of the cost of making said copies.
- E. It shall be the responsibility of each entity or person entering into such an agreement on behalf of the Town to provide and file the required number of copies of said documents to the entities and persons and in the locations specified above. An additional copy shall also be provided to the person charged with maintaining the Town’s internet web site for

the purpose of posting the same thereon; provided, however, the failure for the same to be so posted shall not be deemed a violation of the provisions of this Section.

- F. If a motion to appropriate any funds for any such agreement is made without said agreements and documents having been provided or filed as called for above, the question shall be postponed until the next session of the Town Meeting held after such period has elapsed; provided, upon a majority vote of Town Meeting for each such agreement the provisions of this subsection may be waived, and a vote taken on said agreement.
- G. Notwithstanding anything contained herein to the contrary, such agreements and the powers and duties to negotiate the same shall remain under the exclusive jurisdiction of the appropriate authorities as granted by statute or such other applicable law, it being the specific purpose of this Section to require adequate notice of the provisions of any such agreement be provided to Town Meeting prior to voting on any requested appropriation for the same.

ARTICLE 10 – FIRE ALARM DEPARTMENT PAGERS

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow or transfer from available funds a sum of money to purchase eleven (11) pagers for the Fire Alarm Department to replace the old equipment, or to take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 11 – SOCIAL DAY CARE CENTER

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Fairhaven Council on Aging to expend in the Fiscal Year 2013 a sum of money from the current account “Receipts Reserved for Appropriation for Social Day Care Center” for the purpose of providing a Day Care Program for Senior Citizens or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 12 – ACCEPTANCE OF STATUTE – COLA BASE

To see if the Town will vote to approve the Fairhaven Retirement Board vote to increase the COLA base beginning July 1, 2012 from \$12,000 to \$13,000 consistent with the provisions of Chapter 188, Section 19 of the Acts of 2010, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 13 – ACCEPTANCE OF STATUTE – MINIMUM ALLOWANCE

To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 176, Section 48 of the Acts of 2011 to establish a \$15,000 minimum allowance for retirees who have in excess of 25 years of creditable service, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 14 – ACCEPTANCE OF STATUTE – SURVIVING SPOUSE

To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 176, Section 29 and 30, of the Acts of 2011, to increase the minimum benefits for a member's surviving spouse from \$250.00 to \$500.00 a month under G.L. c.32 §12 (2)(d), or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 15 – HISTORICAL COMMISSION

- A. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow or transfer from available funds a sum of money for the Historical Commission to defray expenses incurred pursuant of its duties to promote, protect and preserve the heritage of Fairhaven; and
- B. For the continued repairs, maintenance, improvements and utilities of the Academy Building; and
- C. For the continued repairs, maintenance, improvements and utilities of the Fire Museum; and
- D. For the continued repairs, maintenance, improvements and utilities at Fort Phoenix; and
- E. For the continued repairs, maintenance, and improvements of the Old Stone School House;

Or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 16 – WATER MANAGEMENT ACT

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow or transfer from available funds a sum of money for engineering and legal fees associated with the Department of Environmental Protection Water Management Act Water Withdrawal Permit or to take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 17 – ETHICS COMMISSION

We the registered voters of the Town of Fairhaven petition the town meeting to vote on the Article to vote on the following Article. To see if the Town shall vote to establish an ethics committee which shall be elected by the town voters each year at the time of the Spring Election. This will be a three member board and anyone serving on this board cannot have any dealings with the town from which they receive financial gain. Members of this board cannot serve on any other board elected or appointed. For the purposes of the first election the person with the highest vote total will serve for three years, the person who receives the second highest vote total will serve for two years, and The Ethics Board will have the following responsibilities and powers. They can investigate any conduct which appears to be unethical or illegal. They can ask for the records from any town board which would include minutes of meetings, e-mails, and any other correspondence which is asked that pertains to their inquiry. If malfeasance is found they can go directly to town meeting with a recommendation with options that include a: call for censure, a vote of no confidence, and an impeachment of a town official. Furthermore as representatives of the town they can ask for the Attorney General to investigate any activity which through their inquiry they found to be illegal or in violation of the open meeting law. Furthermore if they feel that a committee or member of a committee is operating in violation of the bylaws of the town they will contact that board and ask that immediate action to remedy the violation be taken. Any citizen can file a complaint with the Ethics Committee and if requested will be put on their agenda. The committee will determine within thirty days will determine what course of action if any will be taken regarding the complaint. The Ethics Committee will also prepare a code of ethics to be voted by the annual town meeting in 2013. Or to take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 18 – IMPEACHMENT

We the registered voters of the Town of Fairhaven petition the town meeting to vote on the Article: Impeachment of any elected official or anyone appointed to serve on a town committee will follow the following guidelines. Charges of malfeasance can only be brought by the Ethics Committee. The person accused of wrong doing will have the opportunity to present any and all documents, witnesses or any other information before the Ethics committee and before the town meeting. A unanimous vote of the ethics committee in support of the impeachment is required in order to proceed to a town meeting for a vote of impeachment. A vote of 4/5 of the town meeting voters who are present is required for an impeachment to take place. Or any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 19 – TERM LIMITS

We the registered voters of Fairhaven petition the town meeting to vote on the Article to see if the Town shall vote to adopt a by law to be enacted immediately, commencing with the spring election of 2013, and to take any other action relative thereto, as follows: The term for any elected town official shall be limited to a maximum of two consecutive terms. The total length

of service for any elected official shall not exceed six years in any particular office. Any elected official who has already served a maximum term of six years in any particular office, at the time such by-law is enacted, shall be prohibited from further serving in the same position, for an additional term after the expiration of his/her current term of office.

ARTICLE 20 – PUBLIC MEETING MINUTES – 48 HOURS

All video documentation of meetings will be available for viewing at a public location free of charge during regular business hours. Or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 21 – ELECTED APPEALS BOARD

We the registered voters of the Town of Fairhaven petition the town meeting to vote on the Article to To see if the Town shall vote to adopt a by law to be enacted immediately, commencing with the spring election of 2013, and to take any other action relative thereto, as follows: The Appeals Board will be an elected board with the same responsibilities as currently exist. The terms of office to be three years.

ARTICLE 22 – RECALL PETITIONS

We the registered voters of the Town of Fairhaven petition the town meeting to vote on the Article to see if the Town shall vote to amend the current town by law §A502-4, Chapter 516, section 2 on Recalling Town Officials which shall have immediate effect, and to take any other necessary action relative thereto. That the last sentence of this section shall be amended to read: “The recall petitions shall be returned and filed in the office of the Town clerk within thirty days following the date the petitions were issued, signed by at least 10 (ten) percent of the total number of registered voters duly recorded on the registration list of the Town clerk as the preceding Town election.”

ARTICLE 23 – WIND TURBINES

We the registered voters of the Town of Fairhaven petition the town meeting to vote on the Article Out of concern and research which shows that the construction of two turbines in Fairhaven will cause due harm to the health and safety of its residents we ask the town meeting to vote to immediately take all actions necessary to stop and suspend the construction,

installation, and operation, of two wind turbines on land located within Assessors Map 28 Lots 8, 8A and 9, and to take all actions relative thereto to suspend any contracts for such construction, installation and operation of two wind turbines at said location, and further that all necessary action be taken to return the land at the subject location, to its natural state as existed prior to the commencement of construction.

To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following described portion of River Avenue as a Town Way:

Beginning at a point in the northerly sideline of Howland Road said point being the southeast corner of that portion of River Avenue to be discontinued shown on a plan hereinafter referred to:

THENCE, N 00° 02' 14" W, in the easterly sideline of River Avenue two hundred nineteen (219) feet;

THENCE, by a curve in the easterly sideline of River Avenue having a radius of four hundred sixty and 90/100 (460.90) a distance of fifty and 70/100 (50.70) feet;

THENCE, S 89° 57' 46" W, sixty-two and 79/100 (62.79) feet, more or less;

THENCE, S 00° 02' 14" E, two hundred sixty-nine and 60/100 (269.60) feet to the northerly sideline of Howland Road;

THENCE, N 89° 57' 46" E, sixty (60) feet, more or less, to the point of beginning.

Containing 16,223 square feet, more or less, and being shown as 'Existing 60' Wide Public Way to be Discontinued' on a plan entitled "Discontinuance of a Portion of River Avenue, prepared for Nye Lubricants, Inc., by G.A.F. Engineering, Inc."

- Update of Town-wide Infiltration/Inflow removal program

- Upgrades and expansion of wastewater collection system and pumping stations
- Update of the Intermunicipal Agreement with Mattapoisett

ARTICLE 29 – BOSTON HILL WATER TANK

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow or transfer from available funds a sum of money to rehabilitate the Boston Hill Water Tank or take any other action relative thereto.

For little reference, see instrument of taking dated March 20, 1904 recorded in Public Improvement book 1 page 77 and the plan of taking shown in plan book 2 page 65 dated October 25, 1905 at the Bristol County (SD) Registry of Deeds.
- C. To quote from original deed in part, Henry H. Rogers and Emilie R. Rogers to the people of Fairhaven on July 29, 1908. It is recorded with said land records dated June 25, 1903 in book 229 page 420 to have and hold to the said Town of Fairhaven, its successors and assigns forever as a public park under the provisions of the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts now or hereafter enacted relating to parks owned or maintained by municipalities.
- D. Due to the lack of information presented in article #1, dated November 16, 1995, and according to the original deed, a quit claim covenant is illegal.
